Chaplaincy News Sunday 10th November 2013

Liturgy Matters Holy Mass is the centre of our community life as a Church and the way we celebrate Mass says a great deal about what kind of Church we are. The Mass is a miracle. Christ crucified and risen is truly present to his people. Through our hymns and prayers, through our inward thoughts and outward gestures, we welcome this miraculous presence and allow it to transform our lives. Most of us are familiar with the "offertory procession" which takes place in many Catholic churches and marks the transition from the Liturgy of the Word to the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The Christian assembly offers bread and wine to be transformed into the Body and Blood of the risen Saviour. These gifts, along with the offertory collection, are the tangible signs of our life, our labour and the abundance of God's creation. The liturgical practice of bringing the bread and wine from the congregation to the altar is an eloquent expression of the union of our own self-offering with the self-offering of Christ.

War came to an end on "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month". Ever since then, the Sunday nearest November the 11th is known as Remembrance Sunday. In the Holy Name at the front of the church, on the right hand side, behind the Pieta – is own plaque which records the names of parishioners who died during the World Wars. We pray for them especially at masses today.

Pope Francis recently declared a day of fasting & prayer for peace in Syria. This worldwide day of prayer occurred just before the diplomatic breakthrough that prevented (at least temporarily) air strikes and lead to a breakthrough on controlling chemical weapons. Many commentators argued this was no coincidence. Pope Francis is a great source of renewal and hope in the church, as well as a significant advocate for peace in the world. In Wednesday night (7pm) we are hosting a talk by Paul Vallely on Pope Francis in the Chaplaincy. He has written the best biography on Pope Francis in the English language. All are welcome.

November is a month of remembering in the UK. It has been like this since the First World

THIS WEEK'S SAINTS

Monday - St Martin of Tours, a soldier in the Roman army (4th century) who converted to Christianity. In art he is shown on horseback dividing his cloak with a sword in order to clothe a poor man.

Tuesday - St Josephat, Bishop; a native of Lithuania/Belarus, he was a victim (in 1623) of the tragic conflict between the Catholic Church and Eastern Orthodoxy.

Wednesday - St Stanislaus Kostka, of Polish birth, he died as a Jesuit novice in Rome at the age of 18 (in 1568) after having run away from home.

Thursday - St Joseph Pignatelli, a Jesuit who helped keep the Order alive during the period following its suppression in 1773.

Friday - St Albert the Great, a Dominican friar and Bishop (13h century), esteemed the greatest teacher of his time.

Saturday - St Margaret of Scotland (11th Century) a Saxon by birth, she married Malcolm III, king of Scotland and lived a life of heroic sanctity. Also on this day: St Roch Gonzales and Companions, Jesuit missionaries in Paraguay, martyred in 1628.
