THIS WEEK'S SAINTS

Monday – Saint Edward the Confessor is a good reminder that the word "mediaeval" is constantly abused. He was a conscientious and devout king, the last of the great Anglo-Saxons, and his age saw the rise of all the institutions of law and learning and Christian faith which we now take for granted. Like many good and holy people, he is remembered for one mistake. In this case, leaving his succession in doubt. He died in 1066. In came the Normans and the rest is history!

Wednesday – Saint Teresa of Avila, the great mystic and Doctor of the Church, was a reformer of the Carmelite order and a great fighter. She died in 1582 in Avila (Spain), her native city. Tired of so much opposition from the official Church, she poured out her troubles in prayer. "This is how I treat my friends," Jesus said to her. "No wonder you have so few!" she answered. A wonderful and honest disciple of the Lord! Our chaplaincy building is named after her.

Friday - Saint Ignatius of Antioch was a bishop and martyr of the early 2nd century AD. Condemned to die in the Roman arena for no other crime than being a Christian leader, he sent letters to different Christian communities while en route. These surviving documents show the emergence of the Catholic Church in every respect: continuity with Christ through the Apostles, the unity of the Church under the bishops, the miracle of the Eucharist.

Saturday - Saint Luke the Evangelist was a companion of St Paul on his missionary journeys and has given us in his Gospel and the Book of Acts, a beautifully written history of the Church from its beginnings. He brings out the parables of mercy and Christ's love of the poor. He also presents Mary as the modest agent of God's redeeming plan. He is the patron of doctors and artists. (Warm weather at this time of the year used to be called a "Saint Luke's summer." Let's hope for some!)

Becoming a Catholic

If you are interested in learning more about the Catholic Faith, or know someone who is, then you might like to know about the Chaplaincy RCIA programme. This stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, and is in operation in most parishes and chaplaincies throughout the world. The course usually begins in the autumn and leads by gentle stages to the celebration of Baptism or (for converts from other Christian denominations) Confirmation when our Bishop comes to be with us shortly after the Easter break. Candidates will also make their First Holy Communion at that time. We begin with an enquiry stage and anyone can come along for the first sessions with no strings attached just to ask questions and find out what being a Catholic is all about. We use the Catechism of the Catholic Church and other resources. We also come to know one another and to share the experience of God in our lives.

We meet every Wednesday in the Chaplaincy at 7pm and our first session on October 29th. If you are interested, then log onto our website & register with us at www.muscc.org/register and add a word about your interest in the RCIA programme or just speak with any of the chaplains. (Please note: if you are already a Catholic but have not yet been Confirmed, there will be a separate preparation for this Sacrament starting after Christmas.) The course is guided by Father William Pearsall and Micaela Doig with help from past "graduates" of the programme as well as other members of the chaplaincy team. Later we look more in detail at the teachings of the Faith and the great tradition of Christian life that has been going strong since the time of the Apostles. In a world of bewildering choices and manipulative claims on our loyalties, this is a wonderful way of returning to the stability of truth.
