This Week's Saints

Wednesday – Devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus has its origins in the preaching of St Bernadine of Siena (died 1444), whose symbol IHS (the first letters of "Jesus" in Greek) became popular throughout Europe. It was adopted as the emblem of the Society of Jesus. Holy Name Church continues to bear witness to this devotion.

Thursday – St Christopher Magallanes and Companions were among thousands of Mexican Catholics who died as martyrs during the revolutionary years between 1915 and 1937. Most were peasants. All refused to take up arms against the regimes that persecuted them. Many died proclaiming "Long live Christ the King and the Virgin of Guadalupe!"

Friday – St Rita of Cascia was the victim of an arranged marriage and patiently suffered years of violent abuse from her husband. After his death she devoted her life to prayer, penance and charitable work in reparation for the sufferings of Christ. She died in 1457.


