Chaplaincy News Sunday 2nd February 2014

Gathering together for mass is the most important meeting that we have all week. Today's gospel of the Presentation underlines this. As the prophet Malachi predicts in the first reading, the Lord whom you seek will come to the temple. The temple is the place where man encounters God, the temple is the place where we come to offer sacrifices to be reconciled with God. However in the sacrifice of the mass, the most beautiful prayer we can make, we relive the greatest sacrifice of all, Christ giving his body and blood for the sins of the world. His sacrifice trumps all else – and this prayer is being offered 24 hours a day, 7 days a week all over the world, in great cathedrals and in simple chapels, in the heart of great cities and on the tops of mountains, in schools and universities and in rainforests. When we fully appreciate this we value the mass more and we participate more fully.

It was inspiring on Friday night to see and hear all the different ways that people are participating in the mass, and in the wider life of the chaplaincy. We had thirty different students speaking about the groups, activities and opportunities that are offered – with so much everyone only had a minute to speak! It was lovely to see so many new students coming. So if you would like to participate more in the mass, either through reading, serving, singing, welcoming, cooking, folding leaflets, or collecting money, see one of the priests. The great prophets Anna and Simeon speak about seeing the glory of the Lord in the Gospels, with your generosity and involvement we hope that all the visitors to the Holy Name may also see the glory of the Lord when they come to the Holy Name, and that it may bring joy, hope and peace to their lives. www.muscc.org/register

THIS WEEK'S SAINTS

Monday – St Blaise was a 4th century Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia who suffered a martyr's death. Among his good deeds was the extraction of a fish-bone from a choking boy and on this account he is invoked for ailments of the throat.

The "Blessing of St Blaise" will be given after each Mass today.

Wednesday – St Agatha was one of many Virgin Martyrs who bravely defended the Gospel by refusing to yield either their bodies or their spirits to their male tormentors. She died in Sicily in the 3rd century.

Thursday – St Paul Miki and Companions were the first of thousands of Christians who were put to death in Japan during a fierce persecution that began in the 1590s as a result of official hostility to foreign influence.
